## April is Yukon Biodiversity Awareness Month (YBAM)

### Watersheds

Did you know that we all live in a watershed? No matter where you live, work or play, you live in a watershed. Wildlife lives there, too. A watershed is an area of land that water flows across or through on its way to a particular water body, such as a stream, river, wetland, lake or coast. Think of it as the land upon which precipitation (such as rain) falls and flows to a common, watery place.

#### Columbia Spotted Frog

*Rana luteiventris*

In Yukon, the Columbia spotted frog is known to inhabit wetlands on Bennett Lake and in the Hyland River-Iron Creek Lake area. The Columbia spotted frog hibernates under water. This spotted frog prefers permanent ponds up to the tree line and can be seen near pond edges when the snow begins to melt.

#### Arctic Grayling *Thymallus arcticus*

The average Yukon grayling is fewer than 51 cm (20 inches) long and weighs less than 907 g (2 pounds). Arctic grayling are known for their large dorsal fin. The adult grayling have dark purplish blue backs and purplish grey sides with scattered black spots. Insects form the larger part of their diet, but they also feed on nymphs, snails, and eggs.

#### American Golden-Plover

*Pluvialis dominica*

The Plover spring migration occurs primarily in May and fall migration begins in late July. Each year they fly over 30,000 km from the Canadian Arctic to the north coast of South America. These fast flyers reach speeds of 160 km/hour and can fly up to 4000 km without stopping! These birds forage for food on tundra, fields, beaches and tidal flats. Plovers feed mainly on insects, crustaceans, berries, seeds and leaves.

#### White Admiral Butterfly

*Limenitis arthemis*

This large butterfly (6.2 cm wing span) finds its habitat in open aspen forests and riparian areas. The White Admiral is one of the largest and most strikingly colored butterflies. The adults are commonly seen feeding on old bones, animal dung and fish guts.

#### Meadow Jumping Mouse

*Zapus hudsonius*

Packing a kick that will send it nearly three metres through the air, the jumping mouse could be, for its size, the long-jump champion of Yukon wildlife. Of the four species that live in North America, two are found in Yukon. The meadow jumping mouse is the most common and widespread throughout south-central Yukon.

#### Mountain Alder *Alnus crispa*

Common throughout Yukon, Mountain Alder is visible in tundra and open woodland, on mountain slopes and along stream sides and bogs. The Alder is a bushy tree and can grow as high as 3 metres (9 feet). Mountain Alder helps to stabilize river banks and soils during seasonal periods of high water run-off. Parts of the tree are a known food source for several animals including birds.
